The Wilmington College Library is often thought to consist exclusively of physical objects such as books, journals, and rolls of microfilm. And, with over 100,000 items stored on its shelves, that would, in part, be correct. Librarians and staff work diligently in support of learning to acquire, process, catalog, preserve, and maintain an ever-growing collection of materials. However, the Library provides access not only to physical objects such as books and print journals. There is an ever growing number of electronic journal articles, newspapers, eBooks and cutting edge online reports available 24/7 through the resources licensed by the Library. In this newsletter you can read about our newest research databases including CINAHL with Full Text, SocINDEX, and "SMP" (Security Management Practices) used for Criminal Justice, Homeland Security or Emergency Management research. Yes, the Library provides access to an amazing array of over 80 research databases, but the Library provides amazing service as well. It can be said that this service adds value to library resources by helping users (You!) access them. Read in this newsletter about a service that delivers interlibrary loan articles to your desktop. Read also about our new proxy server which opens access to all library databases from off-campus locations. And read about our newest Library staff members who join the dedicated Library team working to extend the scope of the Library. Library Proxy Server

The Library is pleased to inform the Wilmington College community that you can now do library research from the convenience of your home or office. Previously, off-campus access to Library resources was limited to use of your Library barcode. Now, by using your Blackboard or WebCam-

pus portal login and password, you are authenticated to access the Library's full array of research databases including: Proquest Criminal Justice Index, Hoover's Online, Digital Dissertations, SMP (Security Management Practices), LexisNexis, Westlaw, Encyclopaedia Britannica, links to the

NetLibrary collection of

eBooks, as well as all EBSCOhost and FirstSearch databases. Now you can do your research when you're ready, not just when the Library is open!





eBooks Support Research Across the Curriculum

The Library recently acquired access to over 130 electronic books available from NetLibrary. NetLibrary is one of the many electronic book producers and distributors. NetLibrary books can be browsed and read on the web.

HOW TO FIND THEM:

The easiest way to find all of our cataloged NetLibrary e-Books is by typing "NetLibrary" into the library catalog search field and clicking on **Search Everything**. This technique yields a list of available NetLibrary eBooks. Clicking any title in the resulting records will display our print and eBook holdings for that title. Many eBooks are held by the Library in a tradi-

tional print format, but others are only available online. Clicking the link under the "Electronic Access" heading in the title record will take you directly to the NetLibrary site for the selected book. Here you can "View this eBook."

HOW TO READ THEM:

The NetLibrary "View" function allows instant page -by-page browsing from the title page through to the final index entry, with equations, tables, notes, bibliographies, and other scholarly matter faithfully reproduced on screen. To view eBooks from off-campus you will need a NetLibrary account. If you have not already done so, open an account by clicking

on "Create a Free Account" at the top of the welcome page, http://www.netlibrary.com/. Once in the eBook site itself, you can perform full-text word searches across our selections, or even against the entire NetLibrary collection of 20,000 university and trade press titles, which brings an unprecedented bit of between-the-covers search power to your desktop.

FREE "PUBLIC" COLLECTION: NetLibrary also offers uncataloged online access to many titles for free: this is what they call their "Public Collection." Ask a Wilmington College Librarian for more details.

Web Delivery of ILL Articles

The Library is pleased to announce a new service providing electronic delivery of copies requested through interlibrary loan (ILL). Milo Gibbons, Library Technician and Bill Smith, Librarian for Public Services now use Ariel in the interlibrary loan process to send and receive what was formerly mailed between libraries. Ariel Web Delivery is a new service that provides patrons with web access to articles requested through ILL. Here's how it works:

- 1) Choose "Web Delivery" as the pick -up location on your journal article request form (remember to include your email address). Not all articles will be available in electronic format, but we will deliver as many as possible this way. We receive the majority of our articles from other libraries electronically.
- 2) If the article is available in a .pdf file, and you have indicated to us that you would like it



- delivered to your email address, you will receive an email when the article is available for viewing. Do not delete it, as it will contain important information!
- 3) From your email, you will be given a pin number and directed to a website where you can access your article. Once you type in your email address and pin, you will be directed to a link for your article.
- 4) Your document will be available for 30 days, or for you to view up to 10 times, whichever comes first. During that time, you may view it or print it out. Once 30 days have passed, it will be automatically deleted from our server.
- 5) To view your article, you will need to have Adobe Reader on your computer. If you don't already have it, you may download it for free @ http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/rea dstep2.html

In September, the Library celebrated the freedom to read by displaying examples of libraryowned titles that have been banned at various times in American history. Our current display, done in part-

nership with the Wilmington College iTAC Division, focuses on cyber security. In the words of one industry professional "Cyber attacks happen, and awareness is the first step along the road to prevention." Feel free to stop in to the Library to view our ongoing displays. SMP for courses in Criminal Justice, Homeland Security or Emergency Management

The Library is now offering a access to Security Management Practices. **SMP** is an online resource that brings a diverse assortment of expert reports each month exploring topics such as: securing the enterprise network, planning for disruptions, managing risk, protecting intellectual property,

New Nursing, Social Science & Newspaper Library Databases

Nursing and Social Science research are now supported through new Library databases. CINAHL with Full Text includes all of the content in CINAHL plus cover-to-cover full-text for 383 nursing journals. SocINDEX focuses on the Social Sciences and contains full-text for 344

journals dating back to 1895, 700 books, and full text for 6,800 conference papers. Proquest National Newspapers includes full-text back to the mid 1980's of New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Washington Post, Los Angeles Times and Christian Science Monitor.
